Fun Facts: Rabbits

- 1. When a rabbit is really happy, they jump and twist in the air it's called a 'binky'!
- 2. A group of rabbits is called a herd, and they often live in underground tunnels called a warren.
- 3. Rabbits have 28 teeth, and they never stop growing - that's why they love and need to chew!
- A male rabbit is called a buck and the female is a doe; a young rabbit is called a kitten or kit.
- 5. A well cared for house rabbit that has been spayed or neutered has a life expectancy of 8-12 years.

A Closer Look at: Rabbits/Rāpeti

Hopping into Autumn: Keeping Your Rabbits Warm and Happy!

As the weather cools down, it's important to make sure your rabbits stay warm, healthy, and happy. Rabbits are clever, playful, and full of energy. In the wild, they spend their days running, jumping, and foraging for food. If you have domesticated* rabbits at home, they need plenty of space to explore and play too!



All rabbits should live in a suitable environment. A rabbit's home affects how they feel, think and behave. Rabbits in the wild can cover an area the size of 30 tennis courts every day! By keeping domesticated rabbits in an enclosure, or in your home, some of their natural instincts and pleasures are taken away. To make up for this, you need to ensure their living and exercise area is as large as possible.

If your rabbits live outside, make sure their enclosure is:

Warm and Dry: Line their hutch with extra hay and straw to keep them snug. **Predator-Proof:** Check for any gaps where dogs, cats, or other animals could get in.

Protected from the Weather: Place their hutch in a sheltered area to avoid strong winds and rain.

Safe Indoors When Needed: On extra cold nights, bring your rabbits inside or into a shed or garage (as long as there are no car fumes!).

Healthy and Happy Rabbits Food & Water: Always provide fresh hay, vegetables, and clean water to keep them healthy.

Toys & Play: Rabbits love to chew, dig, and explore! Give them tunnels, cardboard boxes, and safe wooden toys to keep them entertained.

A Closer Look at: Guinea Pigs

Small but Mighty: Caring for Guinea Pigs during the colder months.

Guinea pigs may be small, but they have big personalities! These gentle and chatty pets love company and should always have at least one guinea pig buddy. As the weather gets colder, it's important to keep them warm and comfortable.

All guinea pigs should live in a suitable environment. A guinea pig's home affects how they feel, think and behave. The more space you can provide, the happier and healthier your guinea pigs will be. An outside guinea pig home must be strong, draught-proof, dampproof, escape-proof and predatorproof. It must contain shady areas and be well ventilated (allow free flowing air).

If your guinea pigs live outside, their enclosure should be:

Big Enough to Run Around: A spacious hutch and run help keep them active and happy.

Safe & Secure: Their home should



be strong, dry, and protected from wind, rain, and predators. Watch out for uneven lawns - guinea pigs are experts at getting out of their cage to go exploring!

Well-Insulated: Add extra bedding like hay and shredded paper to keep them warm.

Indoor Options: Just like rabbits, guinea pigs may need to come inside on very cold nights to stay warm and safe.

Keeping Guinea Pigs Healthy

Fresh Food & Water: Guinea pigs are herbivores - this means they only feed on plant material. Provide plenty of hay, fresh veggies, and clean water daily.

Did you know? Guinea pigs have a super cool way of making their own vitamin-packed snacks straight from their bums! These special poos, called caecotrophes, are full of important nutrients. If you see your guinea pig "cleaning" themselves and then munching on something, don't

Fun & Games: Give them tunnels, chew toys, and boxes to explore. Guinea pigs love to hide and climb too!

Kind Conservation: How to Grow Your Own Animal-Friendly Garden!

Did you know you can grow yummy, fresh food for your rabbits and guinea pigs right at home or school? Here's how you can create a mini autumn garden that your furry friends will love!



Growing your own garden can be a fun way to help your companion animals stay healthy and enjoy fresh food. Plus, it's a great way to take care of the environment, too!

What to Grow:

- Parsley
- Kale
- Coriander
- Dandelion
- Mint

These herbs and veggies are not only tasty for your rabbits and guinea pigs, but they're also super healthy! Make sure to wash them before feeding them to your pets to keep them safe and clean.

Simple steps to grow your garden:



Pick a spot: Choose a sunny spot in your yard, school garden, or even a small container.



Water regularly: Give your garden a little water every day, but not too much!



Plant your seeds: Plant your herbs or veggies in soil, following the instructions on the packets.



Harvest with care: When the plants are ready, cut the leaves or herbs with clean scissors.

Why avoid harmful plants?

Some plants are harmful to animals and can make them sick. It's important to avoid things like onions, garlic, and potatoes. Always double-check before feeding anything new to your animals!

- Don't ever feed your rabbit or guinea pigs lawnmower clippings - this can upset their digestive system and make them ill.

IMPORTANT: Always check with an adult before feeding your rabbit or guinea pig a plant you have picked. If they don't know for sure what it is or if it is safe - don't feed it to them!

Seven Puppies Left in a Basket Find Hope at SPCA

Earlier this year, Canine Team Lead Christina arrived at SPCA's Hastings Centre expecting a normal day. But as she pulled up, she noticed a washing basket sitting by the Centre gate. Curious and concerned, she went to investigate.

To her surprise, seven tiny puppies popped their heads out, shivering in the chilly air. Christina quickly called for help, and the team brought the puppies inside, where they would be warm and safe.

After health checks, the puppies started their journey to finding loving homes. Due to space limitations, three were moved to SPCA Napier, while the rest stayed in Hastings. Sadly, one puppy didn't survive, but the others grew stronger with the care of SPCA staff.

"They came to us to have a second chance in life," says Christina, "to be protected,

loved, and wanted."

Diego found his forever family, while Dora is still waiting for hers. Chloe and Athena, once shy, gained confidence and have both been adopted. Now, only Zeus and Hestia remain at the Hastings Centre, hoping to find their new families soon.

In Christchurch, a cat named Jasper has made a name for himself - as a sock thief. Jasper loves to steal socks from his neighbours in Sumner, so much that his family had to create a Facebook page to help return the missing socks.

Jasper started his life of crime at just six months old, and now, at six years old, he brings home up to eight socks a day.

Neighbour Rhian Robers was one of his regular victims. "We all know the mystery of the missing sock," she said, "but at our house, it was happening so often it felt like something else was going on!"

Jasper's human siblings, Edward and Harriet, think he's quite proud of his collection. "I don't think he should be proud," said Edward. But Harriet disagrees, saying, "Jasper is very proud of being a famous cat - I can tell by his little grin!"

Jasper's sock-snatching adventures have even inspired a children's book, written by a family member. Meanwhile, his owners have placed a box outside their home filled with over 150 unclaimed socks, hoping their neighbours will reclaim them.

Kiwi Caught Fighting

Two kiwi were caught having a surprise daytime brawl in a Northland garden.

The rare moment happened in the backyard of Karin Matthews, who lives west of Kerikeri. Kiwi are usually nocturnal, which means they sleep during the day and are active at night, so spotting two of them wrestling in the sunshine was quite a shock.

Karin filmed the birds running, kicking, and bashing into each other. "It was fantastic and actually quite comical," she told reporters.

Experts say kiwi fighting is normal behaviour - they're territorial and don't like others invading their space, especially during breeding season. The Department of Conservation (DoC) explained that daytime sightings might happen more during dry weather, when kiwi have to search harder for food.

Todd Hamilton from Backyard Kiwi said, "They might be fighting each other, but if there's a dog in the garden, that might be a danger for them." While the tussle may have looked funny, he said it's a positive sign the kiwi population is healthy. As kiwi roam more, though, they're more likely to encounter dogs - so it's crucial for dog owners to keep their pets under control.

Jade (3), Rikki (8), Jack (11), Gabe (14), and mum Caity have all played a big part in providing a loving and caring home for animals in need. A heartfelt thank you from everyone at SPCA!

Caity and her family's deep love for animals and dedication to fostering animals in need for SPCA has made a wonderful impact, both on the animals they've cared for and their own family. Most recently, they've opened their hearts to Flex, a playful puppy they've fostered and helped on his journey to finding a forever home. Keep reading to learn more about the positive difference they've made through fostering. Here's what Rikki had to say!

Can you tell us a little about Flex? What were some of his favourite things to do?

Flex was the best boy! He loved playing tag with us on the lawn. In the morning he would run into my room and jump on my bed to wake me up (best alarm clock ever!) and at night he would sneak onto my bed and fall asleep, mum would find him because he was snoring so loud!

Why did you and your family decide to foster a puppy like Flex?

When we got Flex he had a sore leg and needed time to rest up. We wanted to help him get better and stay in a nice house with a family while he got better.

What other animals have you and your family fostered? Can you share a little about them as well?

We have had lots of cats and kittens and puppies! We have even looked after birds. We have had bottle babies that need special feeding, and a cat with a busted jaw, Sometimes they stay a long time and sometimes only a short time. I love it when we get home and mum has brought home a new foster, it's like Christmas!

What were some of the best parts of fostering Flex?

My favourite part of fostering is showing them new things and teaching them tricks. I love going on afternoon walks with the foster dogs too.

What were some of the responsibilities you had while fostering Flex?

My job was to take Flex out to the toilet A LOT, and I had to pick up poop! We had to feed Flex 3x a day and make up special puzzles and things for him to do so he didn't get bored.

Did you find any challenges while taking care of any of the animals you fostered? If so, how did you work through them?

Our foster Maggie loved to chew EVERYTHING – including us! We had to teach her how to be gentle and that only toys were for chewing on!











How did you and your family help prepare Flex for finding his forever home? What did you think he needed to be happy in his new family?

To get Flex ready for his forever home we had to teach him manners, like sitting and walking on a lead. We had to teach him not to jump and how to go toilet outside. We taught him how to be part of the family and how to be good around little kids like my little brother.

If you could give other kids one piece of advice about fostering a puppy or any other animal, what would it be?

To give them lots of love and to treat them like they are family.

Craft: Autumn Leaf Rabbit

Get creative this autumn by making a cute rabbit out of colourful leaves! Follow these simple steps to bring your leaf bunny to life.

Materials needed:

- A bunch of autumn leaves (different sizes and colours)
- A piece of paper or cardboard
- Black marker or pen
- Scissors
- Eco-friendly glue (or just arrange the leaves without the glue

Instructions



Collect Leaves – Find different shapes and sizes for the body, head, ears, paws, and tail.



Cut, Glue & Draw – Cut the leaves to shape and stick them down (or just arrange them).





Arrange Your Rabbit – Place a large leaf for the body, a smaller one for the head, and long ones for ears. Add tiny leaves for paws and a fluffy tail.



Add details - Use a marker to add eyes, a nose, and whiskers.
